

A surplus is predicted however a cautious approach will continue as we progress through the remainder of the year.

Council commenced the annual CEO performance review which must be completed by February. Council authorised the Shire President to liaise with the CEO and appoint an independent facilitator to guide Council through the process.

Council entered confidential session to discuss the 2024 Australia Day arrangements. It was pleasing to see a number of community groups put their hand up to hold the event. Council selected the Calingiri Club as the host, and we look forward to working with their committee to make the day a big success. We also thank the community for submitting nominations for the 2024 Community Citizen of the Year Awards. The winners will be announced on the 26<sup>th of</sup> January.

On behalf of the Victoria Plains Shire Council, I wish you a happy and safe Christmas. I hope you get a chance to relax and

refresh. I encourage you to look after each other and remember the real things that are important in life.

I look forward to working with our community to make 2024 even more productive.

## From the Chief Executive Officer: Sean Fletcher

I know I don't have to remind you how quickly the year has passed by. For the Shire, 2023 has been one of significant change and also in terms of delivering projects put on hold previously and with very good improvements to our services and facilities. For such a small local government., we are punching above our weight and I have my staff and the support of Council to thank for that.

From a good governance point of view, the Shire has a very strong result regarding its level of compliance, risk and financial management. The 2022/2023 annual audit was highly successful, with one low value finding. This is a substantial improvement on the previous year's seven findings. The Shire's level of compliance exceeded expectations and a new risk profile was implemented.

In terms of our strategic priorities, Council and I, along with my management team were able to deliver on a number of key objectives including: effective seniors activities (Senior's Christmas in July lunch), the ongoing employment of the community development officer, and the successful rollout of the revised community grants.

We were also able to continue our support regarding a number of successful community events including Australia Day and Anzac Day. We completed year one of a five year program to replace key plant, improved drainage infrastructure (Old Plains Rd Elbow), installed the new inspection hatches to the Yerecoin Sewerage Scheme and successfully installed the new amenities at the Bolgart Caravan Park.

We also implemented the Shire's key informing strategies i.e. the corporate business plan (Implementation plan), the long term financial plan, asset management plan and workforce plan. We also selected a new operating system (ERP), which is being rolled out right now. Also, we have undertaken effective representation at the regional level (AROC, the Avon Midland Zone and the Northern Wheatbelt Regional Road Group).

A key objective this year was to catchup on the WSFN Mogumber-Yarawindah Road project as well as deliver this year's program. I am pleased to advise that we were able to deliver nearly 9kms of upgrades for this road at a cost of \$3.7M. This now leaves the final 3.2kms to be undertaken in 24/25.

A key priority for me has been to work more closely with all six community representative bodies and New Norcia. I believe we have started to bridge some key gaps in this regard including being able to catch up with each group and staff and I attending meetings where possible. This has been reflected through the budget roadshows in Mogumber and Bolgart this year, helping some of these groups receive grant funding, providing improvements to local facilities as requested and letters of support regarding grant funding opportunities.

Under the Tranche One Local Government Reforms, Council resolved to reduce the number of councillors from seven (7) to five (5). Also, as part of the required transition pathway, Council abolished all wards, effective from the October 2023 local government elections. The latter is mandatory for all Class 3 and Class 4 local governments. The Shire is a Class 4 local government.

Finally, I would like to share some lyrics from my favourite Christmas song – Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas from the movie Meet Me in St Louis and sung by Judy Garland:

#### **Annual Financial Report 22-23**

Without it, we don't get the result.

This one remaining item was an interesting debate I had with the auditors, which for me did not warrant raising but they are the umpire and I will abide by the decision and hopefully remediate.

The Shire is planning to hold the Electors Meeting in Feb 24 and I will present this in detail along with the Annual Report 22-23 jointly with the CEO.

### From the Manager, Works and Services: Silvio Brenzi

Works are near completion at the intersection of Carani East and Wongan Hills Road. This project was funded under the Blackspot program to improve safety for road users.

As can be seen from the images, the re-aligned 'T' junction not only allows for safer stopping but also meets Main Roads WA requirements for the Wongan Hills Road to a 90 degree approach and depart angle.

Vegetation was also causing a major influence to the sight lines of east approaching traffic towards the intersection.

This has now been rectified giving a clear view of oncoming approaching traffic.

Main Roads WA will conclude the project with an inspection to confirm project guidelines were met.

This funding is a two-thirds state and one-third shire funded project of \$130,000.00

Once completed, the shire will look for other projects that will meet the requirements for this funding in the coming financial year.



Another generation of Wheatbelt land managers stretched their legs at Boshack Outback in Bolgart this week to learn about the impacts of water quality on aquatic macroinvertebrates in the very special Wattening spring complex of wetlands. The entire Bolgart Primary School spent the day sampling the lake waters at Boshack in an enthusiastic whirlwind of discovery and adventure guided by staff from Wheatbelt NRM and macroinvertebrate experts from EcoAction. The students discovered that the lake supported a moderately healthy array of organisms, typical of a waterbody that has experienced change in hydrology and ecology due to historical land use changes. The aquatic macroinvertebrates found were dominated by the south-west glass shrimp

#### One less seat for regional Western Australia under the hands of Labor

Opposition and Nationals WA Leader Shane Love has expressed his deep disappointment with changes to the state's electoral boundaries, branding them a loss of fair representation for regional voters.

District boundaries are reviewed every four years to maintain similar populations in each electoral seat with the WA Electoral Commission considering communities of interest, land use patterns, Local Government boundaries, means of travel and distance from Perth.

Mr Love, also the Member for Moore, said the changes by the Commission, which amalgamate the seats of Moore and parts of North West Central into a giant seat of Mid West to make way for an additional metropolitan seat, Oakford, is a move that undermines regional voices.

"These changes, which take effect at the 2025 election, compound Labor's attacks on regional representation," Mr Love said.

"In a massive blow to regional communities, the 547 objections to the planned changes have today been set aside, with the Commission handing a win to WA Labor's blatant attacks on regional democracy."

Today's devastating result comes just two years after the WA Labor Government stripped 18 regional members from the Parliament when it abolished the upper house regions in 2021 and four months after they refused to support an amendment to the Electoral Reform Act 1907 to increase the Large District Allowance from 1.5 percent to three percent, which would have had the effect of retaining the current number of regional electorates.

Mr Love said the changes follow WA Labor's submission to the commission, which outlined their plan to abolish another regional voice, making it infeasible for equal representation. "Regional West Australians are suffocating under the hands of Labor," Mr Love said.

"Mid West is a huge electoral seat that will stretch from Muchea to Meekatharra, leaving communities voiceless to make way for yet another metro seat in Perth.

"This giant seat covers 420,000km<sup>2</sup> – more than five times the current seat Moore, double the size of Victoria and half the size of New South Wales.

"WA Labor have now stripped 19 members from the regions, botched cultural heritage laws, failed to support logging jobs and cowered behind the Federal Labor Government's live export ban.

"Today's changes mean when regional West Australians go to the ballot box, the voices of local schools, hospitals, councils and communities will be lost under Labor."

## Boosting network resilience in the Mid West and Wheatbelt





Western Power has begun upgrading 70 distribution transformers across the South West Interconnected System (SWIS), including 19 transformers in the Mid West and Wheatbelt, to increase the resilience of the network.

Distribution transformers, which convert the high voltage used in power lines to a lower voltage that's suitable for residential use, are a vital part of the electricity grid.

Western Power Manager of Operations North Derek Sutherland said the upgrades were part of an extensive package of summer preparedness and bushfire management works to minimise fire risk, strengthen network resilience and improve reliability, with work prioritised based on network requirements.

"With the Bureau of Meteorology signalling increased risk of heatwaves and bushfires this year, we're working hard to ensure the network is as prepared as possible," he said.

"We're upgrading aging equipment and improving the capacity of our assets to prepare for extreme weather conditions.

"We've identified and are upgrading transformers that have previously experienced or are forecast to experience extremely high demand which will help manage overload during peak times.

"While we cannot guarantee 100 per cent reliability, we're doing everything we can to improve network resilience to minimise the duration and number of unplanned outages."

The distribution transformer upgrades commenced in August and involve assets which service more than 6,500 customers across the SWIS.

"Our crews are working to complete the upgrades as quickly as possible to prepare for the warmer weather but some sites are more complex than others so they may take more time to complete," Mr Sutherland said.

"Almost half of the transformers identified for upgrade in the Mid West and Wheatbelt are now complete with the remaining to be upgraded by early 2024."

The transformers selected for upgrade in the Mid West and Wheatbelt are located in Calingiri, Chittering, Clackline, Julimar, Lower Chittering, Moresby, Muchea, Springfield, Toodyay, Waggrakine, West Toodyay, Woorree and Wundowie.





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## **RoadWise Tips**

### ▲ Take Steps to Prevent Driver Fatigue

Driving tired is dangerous. Driving after being awake for 17-19 hours is like having a blood alcohol reading of 0.05. To guard against fatigue, know how much sleep you need and get it regularly.

No-one plans a crash- make every journey safe. The prevalent crash type in the Wheatbelt region is the 'run-off-road' crash, typically where a driver has been fatigued and experienced a 'micro-sleep,' or has been distracted, or taken a bend too fast.

Killed or serious injuries (KSIs) are road crashes that result in death or life-changing injuries. Federal, State and Local Governments are working hard to eliminate KSI crashes: while understanding that people will always make mistakes, we can all do something to improve road safety.

If you're heading away, make sure you get a good sleep the night before your trip, take a break from driving at least every two hours – swap drivers, stop for a walk or a power nap, or enjoy a coffee for the driver at a Coffee Stop or Driver Reviver location.

Watch out for the fatigue warning signs – blinking a lot or squinting, yawning or having trouble keeping your head up, closing your eyes for a moment or losing focus, wandering thoughts, missing a road sign or braking too late, drifting over the centre line or on to the side of the road or seeing 'mirages' ahead.

## Our 3G closure in 2024: your questions answered

Back in 2019 we announced that we'd be closing our 3G network, which you might also know as the Telstra Next G network. Doing so allows us to repurpose the 3G spectrum to offer better coverage and reliability on our 4G and 5G mobile network.

When 3G launched in 2003, we used our mobile devices for calls, texting and accessing very basic information online.

When we say basic, we mean clicking your phone's buttons through a text-only menu, choosing 'footy scores' then waiting 30 seconds for a list of numbers to show up. It was a simpler time!

Today - 20 years later - we use our mobile devices for many data-heavy tasks, and data is central to our experience on them. Demand for mobile data is growing by around 30 per cent every year.

As our technology and our use cases change, we need a network that's fit for today and for the future. That's why we continue to upgrade the technology that underpins our mobile network from 3G to 4G, and now 5G, and in future we will do so again for 6G.

Once we've closed the 3G network, we'll repurpose the radio spectrum that it used to expand the capacity and reach of our 5G network.

We started talking to our customers about saying goodbye to 3G back in October 2019 to make sure they had enough time to understand what changes they need to make.

Over the last few years we have been rapidly rolling out and adjusting our 4G to match our 3G coverage and this work is continuing in the lead up to 3G closure.

This work involves upgrading all existing 3G sites with 4G technology, adding new 4G sites and optimising others to create equivalent 4G coverage in areas where 3G only coverage exists today. As we approach 3G closure further changes in network configuration will also be made to ensure existing 4G is optimised to better ensure equivalence in fringe coverage areas.

It's important to note that mobile coverage is affected by many factors independent of the technology used. The environment, device sensitivity, and how the device is used can all affect your coverage experience.

The environment around you matters. Coverage is impacted by larger fixed terrain features such as mountains and hills in a predictable manner, but coverage is also affected by changeable local geographic features such as trees and new foliage growth, and the construction of new buildings, that may reduce or block previously available outdoor coverage.

These factors mean that your coverage experience at any specific location is inherently variable - and especially over time, even when coverage to the area remains unchanged.

**Not all devices are equal.** Further variability in coverage experience is added by the device used and how it is used. Not all devices are created equal when it comes to network sensitivity – how your device actually detects and connects with our network, particularly at the very edge of coverage, matters.

<u>Our 'Blue Tick' devices</u> have been thoroughly tested to ensure they're able to maximise coverage reach. The way a device is used will also affect coverage, for example whether held to the head or at waist level, above dashboard or in the centre console will all have an effect.

What this means is that to ensure 4G coverage equivalence, you need to use an equivalent device (e.g. Blue Tick 4G if previously using Blue Tick 3G). The same is true for coverage extension devices (e.g. if you used a 3G T-Go you need a 4G T-Go). Finally, you must use it in the same manner (e.g. if your 3G device is mounted above a dashboard in a vehicle, you need to do the same with your 4G device).

**Signal bars don't mean what you think**. It's worth noting that the signal bars displayed on devices can also give a false impression of the level of coverage when comparing between different devices or mobile technologies.

There are no standards between mobile device manufacturers for signal bars. The same signal on one may show more or fewer bars than another device, and as 4G is specifically designed to work and use a lower signal level than 3G it should – all else being equal –show fewer bars for equivalent service in any case.

### Don't Take a Chance When Buying a Car

The purchase of safer vehicles could result in around one third less people being killed or seriously injured in crashes.

A safer car does not always mean a more expensive car. Even cars and light commercial vehicles priced at the lower end of the market are tested for their safety performance, using a rating system of zero to five stars to indicate each vehicle's level of safety, with a 5-star rating being the best.

Vehicles are rated and evaluated against four key criteria:

- Adult Occupant Protection (AOP)
- Child Occupant Protection (COP)
- Vulnerable Road User Protection (VRU)
- Safety Assist (SA) meaning crash avoidance technology.

Next time you're looking to buy a car, consult the stars- your life could depend on it.

## About the settlement of the Western Australia Stolen Wages Class Action

Mr Mervyn Street brought a case in the Federal Court against the Western Australian Government on behalf of all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who weren't paid all their wages or money between 1936 and 1972.

The Western Australian Government has agreed to a settlement of the case in which it will pay up to \$180.4 million (depending on how many people register), which the Court will need to approve before any money is paid out.

A detailed notice giving information about the proposed settlement has been published and can be obtained using the contact details below.

## What do you need to register for the settlement?

If you are part of the class action and want to get a payment from the settlement, you need to complete and send in a registration form by 30 June 2024.

You are part of the class action and able to register if:

- a. you are an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person born before 9 June 1962;
- between 11 December 1936 and 9 June 1972 you worked in Western Australia and worked at some time for little or no wages;
- you are representing a family member who qualifies and has since passed away (if you are their spouse (husband/wife/partner – married or defacto) or child).

If you don't want to claim compensation, you don't need to do anything. But you will still be part of the case, and you will lose your legal rights if the settlement is approved.


