NEWS FROM THE CHAMBERS

Budget 2016 - 2017

Council at its meeting held on the 20th July adopted the annual budget for the 2016 – 2017 year with a rate increase of 4%. Other than rates the main income sources for the year are general purpose grants of \$964,800, Royalties for Regions for the new aged persons units of \$900,000, Roads to Recovery \$567,000 and Regional Road Group funding of \$396,000. A loan of \$170,000 will be taken out to enable the Piawaning desalination plant to be completed before summer. Some of the major expenditure items are Roads and footpaths \$1.485m, motor vehicles, plant and equipment \$705,000, Aged persons housing \$1,057m. Full details of the budget are available by contacting the Finance and Administration Manager, Ian Graham at the shire office.

Avon Tourism Strategic Plan Accepted

Council accepted the Avon Tourism Strategic Plan for the years 2016 – 2019 at the July meeting and included a contribution to them of \$5,000 in the annual budget. The Shire of Victoria Plains is included in the Avon Tourism region which in turn is a part of the Experience Perth area of WA Tourism which encompasses the day trip regions within 2 hours of Perth.

Tyre Recycling and Char Manufacturing in Mogumber

Pearl Global Pty Ltd have set up a tyre recycling and char manufacturing plant in Mogumber and the Department of Environmental Regulation contacted the shire for comment before approving a licence for the project. Council accepted that the company had met all of the environmental issues and resolved that they did not wish to comment.

Lot 100 Mogumber

Council was asked in the July meeting to approve the CEO asking the Department of lands to transfer lot 100 in Mogumber from freehold land owned by the State of Western Australia to Crown Land held as a road reserve. Lot 100 is the land on which Butler Street and Lanigan Street sits and it also includes the unmade portion of Butler Street where it passes through undeveloped but surveyed small blocks south of the Mogumber Tavern. Approval was given for the CEO to pursue this.

Renaming of Golf Course Road Yerecoin

At the June meeting Council resolved to change the name of Golf Course Road to Field Road however after comments from residents of Golf Course Road who are opposed the change the June resolution was rescinded and a new resolution to change the name of a short section of Golf Course Road from Woods Road east to Motoning Road to Field Road was passed and this will now be put to Yerecoin

residents for approval.

Shire Maps

Council asked the administration office to update the shire maps with property owners listed and to have a new map printed off once the update is completed. The old maps were printed some 15 years ago and are well and truly out of date.

Maintenance Grading

Approval was given at the July meeting for the Works Manager to employ another contractor to help with the maintenance grading of unsealed roads in the shire. The western side of the shire has been graded by contractors for several years now and to help staff keep up with the work load it was proposed that the shire be divided up into 3 sections and that as well as the Western portion a second section is contracted out. This section will take in parts of the east and south wards of the shire and ensure that all roads are graded at least once each year.

Freight Collector Roads

Main Roads WA is looking to develop a system of Freight Collector Roads through the regions that will become the main local roads carrying freight to port or the city for sale. The road hierarchy will then consist of small farm roads that connect to the collector roads, the collector roads which will connect between shires and meet up with state owned roads which will form the main freight routes. By doing this it is hoped that traffic will be taken off many local roads and special funding will be made available for upgrading and maintaining these collector roads thereby taking pressure off local government budgets for roads used by heavy transport. The collector roads in Victoria Plains will be the Aglime Route from the western boundary through Mogumber to the Great Northern Highway to New Norcia then along the Calingiri New Norcia Road to the Toodyay Bindi Bindi Road and on to the Calingiri Goomalling Road out to the Goomalling boundary. If the concept is adopted by the state government all farmers will be required to transport their produce via the shortest route to a state owned road or the collector roads even if it means a slightly longer journey.

Works Managers Rant

There has been a lot of damage being done to our gravel roads with transport companies carting various materials from farms within and on the boarder of Victorias Plains.

The Shire of Victoria Plain has a policy in place which is a condition on the RAV network that no heavy vehicle is to be driven on any road that is visibly wet. There are many roads that have a condition that you are required to have Council permission to cart over a particular road and that it is not to be used as a through road.

This is costing the Shire a considerable amount of money and time to repair. If you or your contractors do not know what roads have these conditions, they can find out all the information on the Heavy Vehicle Operations web site through Main Roads WA.

One suggestion from a senior member of our community is to host a class at the Calingiri Gym to teach seniors how to use the equipment gently and correctly.

These classes will only happen if there is enough interest. It is hoped that perhaps car pooling arrangements can be made among residents of other towns to attend, as unfortunately we can't hold the classes everywhere. Please note there will be a small fee involved.

Calingiri Netball & Tennis Court Officially Opened

On the 2nd July 2016, the brand new Calingiri Netball and Tennis Court was officially opened with a ribbon cutting ceremony held prior to the first ever netball match to be played on the court. The ribbon was held over the centre circle by two inaugural Calingiri players and cut to symbolise its opening by Victoria Plains Shire President Cr. David Lovelock.

Netball Club Representative Rebecca Johnson delivered a wonderful speech, in which you could sense her feeling of excitement and achievement to have this wonderful new facility completed for current and future generations of players. The occasion had been many years in the making with Calingiri first fielding a team in the Mortlock Netball Association competition in 2013. As there were no established courts in Victoria Plains, the Calingiri Primary School kindly allowed them to use the school court. Whilst grateful to the school for allowing them to use their facilities, unfortunately it was not the ideal situation with the court being in a state of disrepair and not to regulation size.

With a dream of moving to the Calingiri Sportsgrounds in mind, the club approached the Shire to build a court. The proposal was initially knocked back, but the club persisted, fundraising and gathering volumes of evidence of community support. Eventually they got the majority vote required by Council and the Shire was also successful in obtaining funding through the Department of Sport & Recreation, Community Sporting Recreation Facilities Fund (CSRFF).

Unfortunately for the Calingiri Netball team the day ended with a loss against Gingin.

As always with these community projects there are many people and organisations to thank including the Department of Sport and Recreation, Shire of Victoria Plains, the Calingiri Tennis, Football and Hockey Clubs, Yerecoin, Piawaning and Calingiri Progress Associations, Smiths Stock Transport and volunteers Max Smith, Murray Smith, Dan King, Kyle Manning and Rebecca Johnson.

VP Open Doors Youth Project – Urban Art Workshop

Wow, wow! That pretty much sums up the awesome day we had at the Urban Art Youth Workshop in Calingiri during the school holidays.

The day was planned as our major engagement activity as part of the VP Open Doors Youth Project. This project was funded by the Department of Local Government & Communities, and has enabled the Shire to investigate how to make our community a better place for young people.

Consultant Jodie Mortadza from Consult Innovate Create, and Professional Urban Artist Darren Hutchens (Daz) worked with the youth to uncover their issues, concerns and vision for the future and turned this into a design for the art piece. Please let me tell any of our cynical not so young community members out there, do not write off "youth of today", because what they had to say was thoughtful, inclusive and inspiring.

After a lesson in spray painting, participants were able to create their own design on canvas and then turn to the big masterpiece. The finished product was very impressive, especially given that none of these youngsters had tried spray painting before. The artwork centres on a vision for life in Victoria Plains 2050, with the young people wanting to ensure our towns don't disappear and wish that they can become colourful and vibrant, with great things to do. The seedling that matures into a large tree represents both the growing of the district and the importance of ensuring that our natural environment is nurtured. The War Memorial also features, as the youth believe that this is an important symbol of the history of the district that should continue to be recognised and respected.

The finished creation will now be weather-proofed and installed on the outside wall of the Calingiri Rec Hall, facing the playground.



Drinking alcohol increases your risk of cancer

Drinking and a timely reminder that dalcoholalcohol is a cause of cancer. There is strong evidence that alcohol use increases the risk of cancers of the mouth, pharynx, larynx, oesophagus, stomach, bowel, liver and breast cancers. It is estimated that anywhere between 2000 and 6500 new cases of cancer (or 1.9-5.8% of all cancers) are due to alcohol use each year in Australia.

When it comes to cancer risk, there is no safe level of alcohol consumption. Even small amounts of alcohol increase your risk of cancer. The more you drink and the more often you drink, the greater your risk.

The world-leading cancer agency - the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) - has classified alcoholic drinks and the chemical present in these drinks (ethanol) as a Group 1 carcinogen, the same classification as tobacco.



Other negative effects of alcohol

Drinking alcohol has a number of negative effects other than increasing cancer risk. Other health effects from risky alcohol drinking include damage to the liver, heart and brain, high blood pressure and stroke, and risks to unborn babies. Drinking alcohol at a young age can affect brain development and lead to alcohol-related problems in later life. Alcohol use may contribute to weight (fat) gain, and greater body fatness is a convincing cause of cancers of the oesophagus, pancreas, gallbladder, stomach, bowel, endometrium, ovary, kidney, liver, breast (in postmenopausal women) and prostate (advanced).

Smoking and alcohol

It has been known for a long time that smoking is harmful to health. The combined effects of smoking and alcohol greatly increase the risk of cancer (more so than from either of these factors alone). This is because alcohol makes it easier for the mouth and throat to absorb the cancercausing chemicals in tobacco. Up to 75 per cent of cancers of the upper airway and digestive tract can be related to alcohol plus smoking.

So what should I do?

To reduce your cancer risk, Cancer Council WA recommends you limit how much alcohol you drink or better still, avoid drinking alcohol altogether. If you choose to drink, it is recommended you drink within National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) guidelines, which advise no more than 2 standard drinks a day (for men and women); avoid binge drinking (drinking more than 4 standard drinks on a single occasion) and aim to have at least two alcohol-free days every week.

What is a standard drink?

One standard drink is equivalent to:

100ml wine

285ml (1 middy) of full strength beer

425ml (1 schooner) of low alcohol beer

30 mil (1 nip) spirits

Cocktails may contain more than three standard drinks!





Tips for drinking less

Setting limits for yourself and sticking to them

Aim to have at least 2 alcohol free days per week

Try refreshing non-alcoholic drinks – mineral water with lemon, lime and soda water etc

Try low alcohol or no-alcohol alternatives such as light beer or non-alcoholic beer

Use standard drinks to monitor how much alcohol you drink. By converting what you drink into standard drinks, it is easier to keep track.

Starting with non-alcoholic drinks and alternating with alcoholic drinks

Drink slowly – take sips and not gulps. Put your glass down between sips.

Avoid salty snacks – salty foods like chips make you thirsty, so you drink more.

Avoid 'rounds'. Drink at your own pace, not someone else's. If you do participate in rounds, include some nonalcoholic drinks.

Eating before or while you are drinking. Eating slows your drinking pace and fills you up.

Finish one drink at a time: If people top up your drink it can be hard to keep track of how much alcohol you have consumed.

VP Business Builders Technology Focus: Mogumber July 28th 2016

There was a full house at Mogumber recently, as business owners and community members came along to talk technology and IT for rural areas.

The event, organised by VP Business Builders brought together stakeholders from across the VP Shire, in an effort to gain some insights into how to best manage their internet connectivity.

Daryl Du'Pleisse, from Chittering IT provided an overview of the internet services available to rural regions, and talked about the challenges and viability of each one.

Given the recent roll out of satellite NBN, Daryl suggested that this may be a really viable option for consistent, affordable service for our region and he encouraged attendees to look into it.

Also present was Boyd Brown, Telstra Area Manager for WA. Boyd gave a rundown of the Telstra services available for regional broadband access, plus demonstrated some equipment that could maximises signal efficiency.

Boyd also talked with residents of Mogumber about the upcoming mobile phone tower for the community, which is scheduled to be operational by 2018.

VP Shire Councillor Pauline Carr welcomed the information given, saying it was 'Amazing to have the Area General Manager WA for Telstra visit our town and talk about signal options & the new Mogumber tower'.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE 2016 CENSUS

AUGUST 9 IS CENSUS NIGHT. OUR MOMENT TO PAUSE AND MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

What Is the Census?

The Census of Population and Housing (Census) is Australia's largest statistical collection undertaken by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). For more than 100 years, the Census has provided a snapshot of Australia, helping to shape our nation's education, health, transport and infrastructure.

When is the next Census?

The next Census will be held on August 9.

What does the Census mean to Australia?

The Census provides important information about Australia's people and their housing. It helps estimate Australia's population, which is used to distribute government funds and plan services for your community.

In 2016, the Census will count close to 10 million dwellings and approximately 24 million people, the largest number counted to date.

What should people expect this Census?

From August 1, most households will receive a letter from the ABS, addressed 'To the Resident'.

The letter will include your household's unique Census Login and instructions on how to complete the Census online, as well as directions on how to order a paper form.

How many people are expected to complete the Census online?

In 2016, more than 15 million people are expected to complete the Census online.

Why go digital?

Completing the Census online is fast, easy, secure and environmentally friendly and helps reduce the cost of the Census to the community.

Can I still complete a paper form?

Yes. If a household is unable to access the internet or would prefer to fill out a paper form, simply call our automated paper form request service. You will need your 12-digit Census Login from the letter you received.

Paper forms must be completed and returned in the Reply Paid envelope without delay – don't wait for a Census Field Officer to collect it. I have received a paper form. Can I complete It online?

In some locations, households will receive a paper form upfront with the option to complete the Census online. If you're able to access the internet, just follow the simple instructions on the front of the form to complete it online.

If you complete it online, do not mail back your paper form – please recycle.

Will personal information be shared with other government departments?

No. The personal information which you provide in the Census is not shared with any other government departments or agencies including the police, Australian Taxation Office or Centrelink.

The ABS is legally bound to protect the privacy of all Australians and will not release your information in a way that will identify any individual or household.

What happens to my personal Information after the Census?

After data collection and processing, the ABS will remove names and addresses from other household information. Names and addresses will be stored separately and securely from other Census data. Names and addresses will be destroyed four years after collection or earlier, once there is no longer any community benefit from their retention.

Is the Census compulsory?

Yes. Everyone in Australia on Census night must complete the Census. It's the law.

Where can I find out more Information about the Census?

If you have any questions, like what to do if you're not home on Census night, how to complete the Census in a share house, or what to do if you don't receive your letter, please search Census.

Ever thought of enrolling your child into child care but are a little anxious as they have never been left with anyone else before? Here are a few tips:-

- Get to know us Give us a call and arrange a convenient time for you and your child to come and play at Cubby for a couple of hours - no charge. Look around, meet our friendly staff and join in with our activities.
- If you are returning to work, always start Cubbyhouse before you actually need it. All children are unique and some take longer to settle than others. Some of our current families used Cubby for 2 months before starting a new job and only for a few hours per week.
- At 'drop off', stay and play for a while read a book or do a puzzle with your child.
- Let staff know what comforts and/or interests your child for example a special blanket or toy and take it to Cubby.
- Bring a family photo to add to our family tree.
- Families will be encouraged to work alongside Cubby - staff will ask for advice about your child, work with you on ideas and do their best to match your home routines where possible be sure to discuss specific preferences with
- During an initial settling period, families will only be charged for the hours that their child is at the centre - should they need to be collected early.

Remember you do not need to be returning to work to use child care - Cubbyhouse can help when your relatives live too far away to help, if you need a few hours of 'ME' time, have appointments to attend or to help practise skills children need for kindy.

Worried about the cost?..

Don't be as most families are eligible to some financial help from the Government for childcare and so the maximum a full day at Cubbyhouse would cost most families is \$41.50. Of the \$83 full day fee, our current families (who have both their benefits paid direct to Cubby) only pay between \$23.59 and \$41.50 for a full day at Cubby.

If your family taxable income is less than \$154,697 per year then you are eligible for Child Care Benefit (CCB) as long as you meet some basic criteria. Even if you do not qualify for CCB, it is possible to get a Child Care Rebate (CCR) which entitles you to claim 50% of 'out of pocket' expenses.

You can get up to 24 hours of CCB per child per week without having to work and more if you meet certain work, training, study or volunteer criteria.

Cubbyhouse is an approved child care centre so all enrolments can be assessed for CCB and CCR through Family Assistance/Centrelink. Benefits can be paid as a lump sum to you or can be paid direct to Cubbyhouse and you are only charged the GAP fee.


To claim Child Care Benefit (CCB) and Child Care Rebate you need to call Centrelink, 136 150 - Have your Customer Reference Number (CRN) and date of birth, and your child's Customer Reference Number and date of birth to hand. Other options are to apply online, use the government mobile app or in person or by post. Weather Station

Calingiri Primary School is one of the only schools in WA to have an online weather station streaming live data through our website. The equipment was purchased with support from the Calingiri P&C and Calingiri New Norcia LCDC adding to initial school funds. The Davis Weather Station monitors a range of weather conditions including temperature, rainfall, wind speed and direction, humidity, wind chill and soil moisture. Local farmers recently visited the school and were very impressed with the range of data available and the ease with which it can be accessed. With weather such a critical element in decision making for agriculture, having up to date information readily available will prove highly valuable. 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
