#### **NEWS FROM THE CHAMBERS**

#### STAFFING MATTERS

There have been a few changes in the Shire over the last couple of months which has included:

#### Resignations

- DCEO
  - Community Development Officer (CDO)

#### Recruitment

- The DCEO position being reassessed with the new position being advertised as will become Corporate Services Manager
- The CDO position has now been advertised.
- Applications have closed for the recruitment of depot staff (leading hand and plant operator).

#### Other staffing matters

- The new Building Officer/EHO Allan Ramsay has now joined the Shire and is currently working out of the administration office 2 days per week.
- Staff were reminded of a few things recently via CEO internal Memo including the enforcement of Council policy with regard to personal use of Council motor vehicles.
- A HR review is currently being underway with position descriptions being reviewed for a number of positions with priority being given to those roles which are currently vacant including the Rates Officer, Corporate Services Manager and Human Resource Advisor.

#### SUICIDE PREVENTION COMMITTEE

The very first meeting of the Suicide Prevention Committee was held on 18 July 2017 with a second meeting being planned for September. Staff will be investigating the availability of grants to assist in the development of a Suicide Prevention Plan.

#### WALGA

The CEO and Shire President recently attended the office of WALGA to discuss policies and procedures with James McGovern and the Enterprise Bargaining Agreement (EBA) with Scott Roffey.

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT WEEK

Several Councillors together with the CEO will be attending Local Government Week during the month of August. Attendees will be providing reports to Council on activities and information sessions attended.

#### 2017 ORDINARY ELECTION

Council approved the staff recommendation that the 2017 Ordinary Election be conducted by the Electoral Commission and the method of conducting the election would be as a postal election.

#### ANNUAL BUDGET 2017-2018

Council adopted the 2017-2018 annual budget with the following recommendations:

- That the Annual Budget for the 2017-18 year as presented be adopted.
- 2. That in conformity with the adopted budget that Council hereby levies rates for the year ended 30 June 2018 as hereunder:
- General rate 9.3242 cents in the \$ on GRV and 0.6969 cents in the \$ on UV;
- Minimum rates be \$420 per assessment on all GRV valuations and \$550 on all UV Valuations;
- An incentive scheme of four (4) by \$500 cash prizes be offered to encourage payment of rates in full within 35 days of the issue of the rate notice;
- A late payment penalty of 11% pa be added to the general rates unpaid 35 days after the issue of the rate notice, but not applying to those ratepayers who elect to pay by instalments, except this will not apply to pensioners deferred rates;
- An instalment plan interest rate of 5.5% be charged for those ratepayers electing to pay their rates bill by instalments;
- An administration fee of \$4.50 be charged on all assessments per instalment;
- ESL on all properties is \$75.00 as per legislation;
- Sanitation Charges That Council levy charges for the year ending 30th June 2018 as hereunder:
  - Sewerage charges of \$168.00 per connection or ability to connect be charged for sewerage at both Calingiri and Yerecoin townsites;
  - Rubbish removal charges of \$176.75 per annum per 240ltr bin weekly service on GRV properties and UV properties. For additional bins the charges are \$176.75 per bin.
    - For the Calingiri Townsite there is a charge of \$94.00 per annum per 240ltr recycling bin.
- 4. That the 2017-18 Schedule of Fees and Charges be included in the budget document.

This resolution was passed 8/1 with Cr Broadhurst asking that his negative vote be recorded.

#### Calingiri & Bolgart Tip Passes

The Tip passes which residents/ratepayers currently hold expire at the end of August 2017.

New Tip passes will be issued together with the Rates Notices which will be sent out during the week commencing 31 July 2017.

(Not Debit Cards) at the rate of 1.47% on all future Transactions.

#### WET GRAVEL ROADS

#### **Heavy Vehicles**

The Shire would like to advise all land owners that they have an obligation to the Shire to abide by the law regarding the use of gravel roads in wet weather. There is to be no access to gravel roads when it is visibly wet. Those who are found to breach these laws, will be liable for prosecution by MRWA under the heavy vehicle regulations.

The costs associated with repairing damages roads are quite significant! If this practice continues, Council will need to consider increasing rates to cover repair costs.

The Shire is also looking at having a text type system that will alert owners and contractors of closed roads within the Shire of Victoria Plains.

The Department of Fire and Emergency Services will be sending out a request to the open market for the *Hire of Services for Mitigation Works* in the near future.

This will be conducted through Tenders WA in the upcoming weeks, and you will need to register your business at

#### 1<sup>st</sup> August 1917

#### Dear Diary,

Yay! The ribbon has just been cut to officially announce Calingiri Primary School open/. I am the first student through the gates. When I walked through the gates I saw a metal playground and wooden buildings. I heard someone calling my name. "Margaret, Margaret!"

I turned around, it was mum. She was waving goodbye in the carriage. Our old Horse Barney pulls us everywhere.

As I walked into the classroom, the teacher was writing many words on the board. She had short, brown, curly hair. She is dressed in a lacy white shirt, a short black jacket, a long brown skirt, stockings and pointy black shoes. I also noticed long fingernails. I suppose she uses those for scratching the blackboard. I found my desk, it was long and wooden. Each desk had a slate and a pencil.

The bell rang and kids came rushing in with excitement but that soon ended with a deafening shush by the teacher. She held the cane up and told us to sit up straight, use our manners and be perfect! Her voice echoes around the room. I was beginning to feel frightened. I quickly sat down and copied what she had written on the board. What a great day!

#### Dear Diary,

Today I am excited that I am finally going to school. I can't believe it is finally open – yay!! When I walked into the classroom I saw on desks and ink wells in them. #### 1<sup>st</sup> August 1917

I got to school by horse and cart. There are a lot of desks. They are very long and fit a lot of people on them. The first person I saw to be hit with the cane was a person who was writing with his left hand. The teacher had a big chalk board and she kept going around the room inspecting peoples work. Tomorrow I think we are making envelopes.

From Louis (Year 4)



#### Dear Diary,

1<sup>st</sup> August 1917

I am really excited that Calingiri Primary School has finally opened. We all have slate boards and wooden desks. I walked to school and I was the first student there. I was the first student to try our new slate pencils. My teachers are Miss Longford and Miss Brennan. The school is really big and so is the classroom. When we learn, Miss Longford writes first then we have to copy it. She walks around and looks at our work. If you write with your left hand, you will get the cane across your knuckles. When you get asked a question you have to politely stand up and answer what the teacher asks.

From Sophie (Year 5)

#### 1<sup>st</sup> August 1917

#### Dear Diary,

The school just opened. The classroom is old. They have wooden desks. I feel nervous because it's my first day of school. My classroom is full of students waiting anxiously for the teacher to arrive. I have heard if you're naughty you will get the cane.

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#### Restricted Access Vehicle Route Assessments

#### Local Government Update – Issue 8

Welcome to the first Local Government (LG) Update for 2017. It has been some time since our last update and with the 2016/17 harvest season now well and truly behind us, the demand for our services continues to grow with a steady number of new route assessment applications being submitted to our office each month.

As communicated in LG Update 6, we changed the process for applying to add or amend a road on a Restricted Access Vehicle (RAV) Network in September 2016. This has streamlined the process and provides a more efficient service to both the applicant and Local Government, with all requests to add or amend a road on a RAV Network being submitted directly to us at Heavy Vehicle Services (HVS).

HVS is committed to finalising all received applications within three months from date of receipt. This allows four weeks for confirmation of road owner support and up to eight weeks to conduct and process the assessment. Based on the 2016 baseline figures and target turnaround time of three months, approximately 450 road/ road segment assessments may be in process at any given time.

As of 21 June 2017 there are 440 outstanding road/ road segment assessments. Of this number, 149 are with the road owner (often local governments) for confirmation of their support for the requested access. This is the first stage of the assessment process. The remainder are with Main Roads and are at various stages of the assessment process.

Reducing the volume of outstanding road/road segment assessments to this level is largely due to the combined efforts of both Main Roads and Local Governments in providing ongoing support in prioritising the completion of the onsite assessment component. We would like to acknowledge and thank you all for the hard work you have undertaken in making this possible.

#### What does a route assessment application look like?

A route assessment application may consist of a single applicant (transport operator or road asset owner) requesting RAV access to a single section of road or an applicant or road asset owner requesting RAV access to multiple roads. These factors directly impact on the volume of work required in completing each application, with an onsite road assessment required for each road section or entire road length as determined in the application.

#### What does this mean for Local Governments?

The majority of route assessment applications being received are for LG roads, meaning you as an LG are likely to be receiving numerous requests from us. To further clarify, we send applications to LGs because:

 We require your support as the road owner for the proposed RAV access as a prerequisite to an application being assessed and we ask that you respond within 4 weeks. If access is not supported please provide justification in determining the decision, which we can then provide to the applicant.



#### Free Spirit Bike n Car Club

On Wednesday, the 19th July, the Founder of Free Spirit SMCC, Mal Palmer (Chopper), bought the club trailer in to the July ordinary meeting of Council for an inspection by Councillors. The trailer was the result of a collaboration between the Council and Free Spirit, its goal to raise awareness about domestic violence and depression.

The Free Spirit Bike 'n' Car Club is an organisation who regularly donates their time and energy towards charity programs and events. They say NO to domestic violence, and aim to shine a light on the often difficult topics of depression and suicide. In the past they were involved with providing aid to those affected by the Yarloop bushfire, running \$30,000 worth of hay and supplies to those who needed it the most. They also assisted the Log Fence Pony Club by raising money to repair the club's infrastructure, and are regulars in many local automotive events; spreading their message as widely as they can. In the future the Club plans to assist the Shire in suicide prevention programs and other community-focused concerns.

#### **New Membership Fees**

Following a review of transport fees and memberships, St John Ambulance Head Office has made a minimal increase to fees effective from 1<sup>st</sup> July, 2017. Annual family memberships are now \$89 and single memberships \$54. Call out and transport fees have also risen.

#### Gas Explosion at New Norcia!

A gas explosion at New Norcia led to seven casualties and a frightening scene for local St John Ambulance volunteers last month.

Ten volunteers were on hand to triage (prioritise) the patients, which included a badly injured young baby.

Luckily, it was not a real explosion. Instead, it was a scene created for training purposes by Community Paramedic, Duncan Jones and New Norcia volunteer, Jane Graham.

The training was designed to allow volunteers to experience mass casualties using special mass casualty kits which are located at the New Norcia and Calingiri ambulance sheds. The training included the two ambulances and allowed volunteers to practice their triage techniques, prioritising patients and communicating with St Johns head office.

Our volunteers give up their time to make sure they are well skilled to handle any situation that is thrown at them.

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
