

Newsletter submission - July 2017

From the Desk of the CEO

The June Council meeting was well attended and it is great to see the community interest and participation. Just in case you couldn't attend, please continue reading for an update on what took place.

Public Question Time

There were a number of questions from residents with regards to the operations of the Works Depot and grants that have been applied for or received by council for community projects in the past 12 months. There was also interest in the planting of trees on Mofflin Street including reticulation and the removal of an unlicensed vehicle.

Other items were as follows:

Extractive Industries Approval

Council considered a request for a proposal for extractive industry (being gravel and sand) on lot 127 (668) Mogumber-Yarrawindah Road in Mogumber. The application was granted approval with a range of conditions which are outlined in the minutes of the meeting and can be found at http://www.victoriaplains.wa.gov.au/documents/

Council Committees

Council continued it's progress in establishing a Suicide Prevention committee which will comprise 3 "foundation" members and the CEO. Council is also forming a committee to work through recognition of Aboriginal Heritage and native title issues with SWALSC. Upcoming meeting dates are yet to be confirmed.

Delegations Review

Council has now revoked delegation No. 2.5: Application for Donations or Financial Assistance. All applications for donations or financial assistance will now be decided by council at its ordinary Council meetings.

Council Finances

Payments made from the Municipal Bank Accounts and endorsed by Council, totalled \$480,263.88 for the month of May 2017.

Community Donation

Approval was also granted for a donation to Free Spirit SMCC for trailer repairs provided the trailer is only used for community activities and the Shire is recognised as a contributor.

It's always good to see and hear from community members. All the questions raised have been taken on notice and a response will be provided at the next ordinary council meeting which will take place on 19 July 2017 commencing at 2.00pm.

If you are attending the Council meeting it is a requirement that you abide by the directions of the Presiding Member and the Shires Standing Orders which State:

Admission and Removal of the Public

(1) The public is admitted to the meeting place on the basis that no expression or dissent or approval, conversation or interruption to the proceedings of the meeting shall take place. In the event of any such interruption, the President may use discretion and without a vote of the meeting, require those interrupting to withdraw. The person or persons concerned shall immediately withdraw from the meeting

place. This direction by the President shall not be open to discussion or dissent.

(2) Any person, not being a Member, who interrupts the orderly conduct of the business of the meeting who does not withdraw immediately upon being called by the President to withdraw from the meeting place may, by order of the President, be removed from the meeting place.

Now that there has been some rain, grading of the roads will commence, starting with shoulder grading on Yerecoin South East Road. Contract operators will also be out and about so please look out for them, be courteous and slow down.

Wet Gravel Roads

HEAVY VEHICLES

The Shire would like to advise all land owners that they have an obligation to the Shire to abide by the law regarding the use of gravel roads in wet weather. There is to be no access to gravel roads when it is visibly wet. Those who are found to breach these laws, will be liable for prosecution by MRWA under the heavy vehicle regulations.

The costs associated with repairing damages roads are quite significant! If this practice continues, Council will need to consider increasing rates to cover repair costs.

The Shire is also looking at having a text type system that will alert owners and contractors of closed roads within the Shire of Victoria Plains.

If any one sees heavy vehicles on roads that they should not be on, please inform the Shire or Main Roads Heavy Division. All reports will be kept confidential.

REPORT A FAULTY STREET LIGHT

Did you know?

Street lighting is provided to the Shire by Western Power who supply, maintain and upgrade lights. Western Power however does not guarantee that all lights will be operational every evening.

The Australian Standard for street lighting allows for up to five percent of lights being non-operational at anytime. Western Power state that they will repair reported street light faults within 10 working days.

The only information Western Power requires to repair the street light is the street that it is on, the nearest house number or the pole number.

Anyone can report a faulty street light!

Every resident shares the responsibility of reporting faulty street lights. The reporting process is quick & easy. Reports need to be made directly to Western Power, not to the Shire.

To report a faulty street light:

Like its predecessors the third New Norcia Writers Festival emphasis is still on literature as performance, with author readings accompanying each session. But this time there is an even stronger focus on the history and practice of West

Australian Wheatbelt literature, leavened by humorous observations on ageing, spirituality and the struggle to get words down on the page. We pick up the trails left by previous NNWF authors like Bernard Rooney, John Kinsella and Stephen Scourfield, who have all written so eloquently about the Wheatbelt and its inhabitants. Stephen Scourfield returns, again accompanied by Will Yeoman on guitar, to counterpoint the rural England of his youth with sharply observed accounts of "learning" rural WA "from the bottom up". In another geographic and cultural counterpoint, Nicole Sinclair talks about and reads from her debut novel Bloodlines, in which the WA Wheatbelt of 31-year-old Beth's childhood and the story of her parents is contrasted with her new life on an Island in Papua New Guinea.

UWA academic Tony Hughes-D'Aeth's Like Nothing on this Earth: a Literary History of the Wheatbelt, a monumental and unprecedented study of WA Wheatbelt literature, is more like a symphony, telling the story of the Wheatbelt through the words of some of our finest authors from Albert Facey to John Kinsella. By contrast, acclaimed WA author and Zen student Brigid Lowry offers her witty observations on what it means to be an ageing woman in today's society and how best to live, love and write.

As usual we will be utilising the beautiful spaces around the town to host the sessions, this year we are hoping to use the glorious Spanish Chapel which was renovated as a Friends Project in 2012. Ticket holders will also have access to the Aboriginal cultural display and the Abbey Press and Dom Robert Nixon is going to provide a musical interlude. It promises to be a very special day.



Defibrillator Installed in Yerecoin

Yerecoin Progress Association with the assistance of Volunteer Officer, Jane Graham were successful in obtaining a CBH Group grant to purchase a defibrillator for the Yerecoin townsite. CBH has been generously sponsoring the placement of defibrillators throughout the Goldfields, Great Southern, Midwest and Wheatbelt regions of WA. Sudden Cardiac Arrest is one of the leading causes of death in Australia. In most cases the key to survival is prompt defibrillation, which is most effective when carried out within minutes of a Sudden Cardiac Arrest. Volunteer Ambulance Officers are trained in the use of the Defibrillators and eventually community members will also have the opportunity to be apt in their use.

Changes to child health services

WA Health provides important, free child health services that support Western Australian families to raise happy, healthy children. Child health nurses offer assessments, screening, immunisation advice, and support to all families of babies and young children.

From July, we are making changes to the statewide child health services to make them even more flexible and helpful for children and families.

From July 2017, the Purple Book health checks are ...



The ages for Purple Book health checks are changing to better fit with important ages and stages of children's growth and learning before they go to school.

If a child has a Purple Book that doesn't yet include information about the new health check schedule then their child health nurse will provide some new pages at their next appointment. The Purple Book will then be up to date with information to match the new schedule.

Child health services are becoming more flexible ...

Changes are being made so that child health services are more flexible and can provide families with extra support at times when it's needed. This includes providing extra appointments for families needing additional support, and offering group sessions and drop in sessions.

How will families know about the changes?

The changes to child health services are being communicated to families in a number of ways. This includes through text message, information at child health clinics, media and newspaper channels, and information on the internet at www.healthywa.wa.gov.au/childhealth.



'Roger's Razor Gang' to hit health services in Moore

The State Government has refused to rule out closing regional nursing posts and district hospitals under Labor's new "razor gang", threatening to plunge health services in Moore back into the dark old days of pre-Royalties for Regions.

The Nationals last week questioned Health Minister Roger Cook in Parliament over his Sustainable Health Review, which allegedly aims to "improve financial sustainability" in the health system.

Member for Moore Shane Love MLA said long-term regional residents would remember Eric Ripper's Razor Gang back in the early 2000s when the previous Labor Government took a hatchet to all government services.

"Now we've got 'Roger's Razor Gang' looking to make similar cuts to the regional health sector," Mr Love said.

"In 2008 the former WA Country Health Service chief executive Christine O'Farrell was critical of Labor's city-centric view of health funding which left country patients the poor cousins. "Who could forget the CEO of Country Health stating the regional responsive emergency system was "blatantly bloody unsafe" under Labor."

Mr Love said before Royalties for Regions and the Southern Inland Health Initiative (SIHI), critical pockets of country health were rendered ineffective due to Labor Government shortfalls in funding and the training of doctors, particularly GPs with the broad range of skills needed for country practice.

Mr Love said Labor's abysmal track record in country health during the early 2000s was a catalyst for the establishment of Royalties for Regions.

"The WA Nationals were determined to end Labor's failure in regional health by putting Western Australians living outside Perth at the front of the queue for the first time ever," he said. "We initiated the rebuild of WA's country health system through the \$560 million Southern Inland Health Initiative."

Mr Love said this Razor Gang review is taking place at a time when the McGowan Government is refusing to commit to the continuance of the SIHI program and to the implementation of the Turquoise Coast Health Plan. "This is a desperately needed boost to health areas in the coastal and peri urban districts which traditionally have had very limited services," he added.

"Both these measures were approved by the previous government and funding allocated via Royalties for Region. "The current Minister should immediately commit to their future and end the ongoing uncertainty and fears about future health services."

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Letter to the Editor

Staggering increases to water, power, licenses and other charges announced this week will add \$440 a year to the expense column of each WA household.

The McGowan Government is forcing Western Australian households to bear the brunt of Budget repair while refusing to negotiate with the State's biggest mining companies to update an outdated 1960s fee in their State Agreements.


This is a slap in the face for WA mums and dads, small businesses and seniors when the Premier has refused to take up The Nationals' policy of negotiating an increase to the 25 cent special lease rental fee paid by BHP Billiton and Rio Tinto. The rental charge is not new — the miners have paid it for decades — nor is it a royalty.

Mr McGowan has said everyone needs to share the budget burden but these increases to fees only create pain for households with little gain in the deficit column - just \$59.5 million per year. The Nationals' policy would see \$7.2 billion added to the State's bottom line by increasing BHP and Rio's outdated rental fee.

The Nationals accept the mining companies pay a significant amount of royalties to the State – and we understand the importance of the industry to Western Australia and nation. We aren't advocating ripping up State Agreements. But we do not accept the McGowan Government allowing a fee struck 50 years ago to remain untouched forever while asking West Australian households and small business to foot the bill.

Every West Australian should be demanding the Premier show some intestinal fortitude. It's time Mr McGowan stands his ground on behalf of West Australians and demand a fairer contribution from BHP and Rio.

Watheroo doppler now online

Real time rainfall and wind data will now be available to farmers in a 256 kilometre radius from Watheroo with the launch of the state's latest Doppler radar on June 8. An initiative of the Nationals WA made possible with \$23 million Royalties for Regions funding, the Watheroo Doppler will complement Doppler radars already operational at Newdegate and South Doodlakine giving coverage to the state's grain growing area.

Member for Moore Shane Love MLA said the three radar sites combined with the Department of Agriculture & Food WA's (DAFWA) 175 weather stations - also funded by Royalties for Regions - would provide farmers with comprehensive wind and rain data that is updated every six minutes on the DAFWA and Bureau of Meteorology websites.

"Information can be localized to a paddock perspective and will help with decision making around the application of spray and fertiliser," he added.

"This real-time data will also prove useful for emergency service responses and to the aviation industry.

Mr Love said earlier research had established that expansion of BoM's Doppler radar coverage would deliver more than \$100 million in benefit to farmers in the WA grainbelt over a 20 year period.

"This research found that the more timely application of spray would deliver a sixfold benefit to farmers, for every dollar invested in Doppler radar," he added.

"This is Royalties for Regions funding that has been wisely spent in response to a very real need."

The weather monitoring service in Geraldton is to be upgraded to Doppler radar capability, with the service due to be operational in April 2019.

Love: electoral interference a threat to democracy

Member for Moore Shane Love MLA has called for an inquiry into electoral interference following the Chamber of Minerals and Energy campaign ahead of the recent state election.

Addressing the WA Parliament, Mr Love said the level of interference during the most recent state election campaign from special interest groups was very worrying and a threat to democracy.

"The Chamber of Minerals and Energy, a large and well funded organisation, went to great lengths and great expense to get their message across during the election campaign," Mr Love explained.

"It is not the message that was being pedalled that I am concerned about in this instance, but rather the method this group employed.

"In addition to the extensive media campaign in the lead up to the March 11 election, the CME had corflutes on show at polling booths and throughout my electorate; these posters did not have the correct authorisations required for election material."

Mr Love said the CME had been involved in the political process but did not represent a political party, nor tender any candidates.

"The Nationals WA's former leader, Brendon Grylls fell victim to a concerted campaign funded to the tune of millions of dollars by companies such as Rio Tinto and BHP - the CME campaign was relentless," Mr Love said.

"The CME example demonstrates how special interest groups can target an individual member and influence a particular outcome in the election.

"That is a very powerful tool and it opens up a real Pandora's box in Western Australian politics; this is a very dangerous precedent and should not be allowed to continue."

Mr Love said the matter needed examination before the next state election and emphasised that the focus of an inquiry needed to be the process of interference and how this has the potential to impact the political process as we know it.


